These artists used: canvas, paints (oil and watercolor) and different kinds of paintbrushes.

1st Grade

Standard 1.V.CR.2: Explore the use of materials and tools to create works of art or design; demonstrate use of art materials, tools, and equipment in a safe way; and identify and classify uses of everyday objects through drawings, diagrams, sculptures, or other visual means.
